Sport in Art, published by the Museum of Contemporary Art in Kraków, presents the most recent contemporary art, both Polish and international. To be more precise, the Museum focuses on exhibiting contemporary art of the last two decades. It was opened quite recently—in 2011.

Sport in Art was published to accompany an exhibition which took place between May and September 2012 in the Museum. It presents over forty artists and their unique perspectives and interpretations of sport. As Maria Anna Potocka stated, “The range and diversity of the artistic problems that arise under the influence of sporting inspiration are—even within the narrow scope of this exhibition—truly impressive.”

The world of sport is full of drama and pervaded with symbols. Therefore, it is not surprising that sport is frequently featured in art—in a diversity of guises. According to Potocka, “The great applicability of sport as an inspiration for artists lies in its potential for symbolic reference to human existence.” Sport definitely has the power to inspire, which is sometimes underappreciated in scientific research.

The book is divided into two sections. The first part contains deliberations on the place of sport in culture and the contemporary world, while the second presents the works of individual artists.

The texts from the first part begin with a peculiar and somewhat chaotic paper, *Sports Chorus*, by the Austrian Nobel Prize winner Elfriede Jelinek. Józef Lipiec in his rich and meticulous dissertation *Sport and Philosophy* insightfully discusses questions regarding the very essence of sport, the structure of the phenomenon of sport, and the axiology of sport, with intriguing sub-sections on the aesthetics of sport and ethical values in the world of sport. This is a significant part of the book, worth recommending to people interested in sport but lacking some theoretical background. Honorata Jakubowska discusses sport from a feminist point of view, and then comes an interview with Jochen Gerz—an artist and sports journalist—and two texts: one by Lucien Kayser (on Nicolas de Staël and Harun Farocki), as well as Potocka’s general observations about sport and the exhibition in Kraków.

The section devoted to the artists is generously illustrated with photographs and reproductions of paintings; there are also comments on their works. One can familiarize oneself with numerous interesting examples of the presence of sport in art. Different artists put emphasis on different aspects and finer points of sport. For many of them, football was the greatest inspiration, but other sports, like tennis, boxing, or ski jumping, are also present there.

For Jerzy Nowosielski, sport is just a pretext for undressing women and exploring the dark side of human nature. Edward Dwurnik's art contains political messages. Margaret Eicher's prints on fabric show dynamic moments in football. Ingeborg Lüscher demonstrates passion and fury on the pitch. Vlastimil Hoffman connects the footballers of Wisła Kraków with a mysterious guarding angel. Zuzanna Janin shows the competition between a man and a woman. Zdzisław Sosnowski presents a ball in different situations and serving different purposes. Questions of patriotism, propaganda, masculinity, and armed conflicts, among others, may be found at the core of other works. Moreover, some of them provide the observer with a dose of humor as well.

The strength of *Sport in Art* lies in this combination of theory and artistic output

and, definitely, the fact that it is written in two languages—Polish and English—is a tremendous asset. The book is a rather light read, although it initially seems overly packed with theory. In spite of the fact that the book presents just a tiny sample of contemporary artists, this group seems rather well selected.

Sport in Art is of interest to anybody concerned with the discourse on sport and art, and should be on the shelf of any scholar interested in either subject. It should be useful not only for researchers, but also students examining the intersection of sport and art. Readers can expect to come away from this book with new insights into the artistic output inspired by sport, but also an appreciation for sport in general. All in all, this interesting publication is a solid contribution to sports and art studies.
